

Table 6.3 Differences Between High School and College

| Rights and Responsibilities | High School | College |
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| Your right to an education | Education is a right and must be provided. Attendance laws require presence. | You must go through an admissions process and meet the criteria to be admitted to the college. |
| Rights as a person with a disability | IDEA entitles you to special education services and accommodations for your disability. | The Americans With Disabilities Act and Section 504 provide some services and accommodations for individuals with disabilities. |
| Identification of a disability | The school is responsible for identifying your disability. | You are responsible for documenting your disability and requesting services. |
| Accommodations | Your IEP states the accommodations you are entitled to receive, and the school must provide these accommodations. | You must apply and request accommodations. Once the college approves the accommodations, you must arrange for the services through the disability services office and self-advocate with your professors. |
| Support | Teachers, parents, school counselors help you to make decisions. | You will need to ask for support and assistance from the disability services office. |
| Access to records and grades | Up to the age of 18, your parents can access your school grades and participate in IEP meetings. | After age 18, your parents cannot access your school records or grades without your written permission. |
| Class meeting times | Generally, classes meet every day and are between 45–90 minutes in length. | Classes may meet 1, 2, 3, or sometimes 4 tines each week; class sessions can range from 45 minutes to 3 hours. Your class schedule will change every term/semester. |
| Class location | Your classes meet in one or maybe two different buildings on one campus. | Your classes will meet in different buildings in different locations on the campus. |
| Contact with teachers | You usually see your teachers every day. | You will probably see your teachers only on the days you have class. You will need to make an appointment to see a teacher at another time. |
| Class size | Usually, your classes range from 25–30 students. | The students in a class can range from 30 to over 300 students. |
| Assignments | Teachers will remind you about assignments, due dates, and tests. | You are expected to check the course syllabus for assignments, grading criteria, and due dates. |
| Costs | If you attend a public school, it is free. | You are responsible for paying tuition and fees to attend college. If you need financial assistance, you are responsible for applying for financial aid. |
